# Run for Office and Help Shape DCLA's Future by Noel Rutherford

By the time you receive this newsletter, the American Library Association's 2005 elections will be just around the corner. This year, ALA will once again allow members to vote online with a number of enhancements to ease the process (paper and electronic). Voters will be able to view council candidates biographies online and there will be a longer period to request paper ballots – call (800-545-2433) or email your ballot request (membership@ala.org) by March 9. The convenience of the online voting option proved highly successful with a huge 28% increase in voter turnout last year. ALA hopes to experience further gains when the polls open March 15, 2005.

DCLA members have often held leadership positions within ALA and I would like to remind our members to let DCLA know when they are running for elected office. This year, Jane Sessa, a former DCLA director is running for a seat on the ALA Council. We wish to congratulate Jane and support her in her election bid.

In a few months, DCLA will also hold its annual elections. Mary Augusta Thomas, our nominations chair, is eager to hear from individuals interested in running for office. If you want an opportunity to make changes, further your career, develop leadership skills, and represent your colleagues, DCLA has the job for you.

Why should you run for office? Your decision should be based on your own personal reasons and may be influenced by a number of factors. Before taking that step, make some notes about why you are running. Are there some things you think DCLA should be doing differently or are there some key issues you think need more attention? What can you offer in terms of experience, commitment, enthusiasm or a new perspective? What position do you want to run for? What are the responsibilities of that position? To help answer the last of these questions, DCLA has on its Web site at www.dcla.org a complete job description for each elected office holder.

One of the chief rewards for running for office and serving is the opportunity for personal growth. You will find strengths in yourself that would've been hard to discover in any other way – a knack for explaining complex subjects, for example, or the ability to talk easily with different kinds of people. In addition, you will learn about the larger library community. You will interact with members from different types of libraries and library organizations. As a result, you will know your library community in a way few others do - and you'll have friends and acquaintances everywhere.

As we look toward the future, I'd like to encourage you to get involved with DCLA. The surest way to do this is to run for office. 

# Now at a Computer Near You – Google Print by Kirsten Allen

In the six years since its inception, Google Inc. founders Sergey Brin and Larry Page have worked tirelessly to become the number one search engine for Internet users around the world. As Google engineers continue to harness technology to remain ahead of the competition, new and improved search features are emerging from Google's labs. The latest announcement by Google looks to please the literary lover in all of us.

In October of last year, Google announced a new search interface available from their Web site called *Google Print* (print.google. com). This new search option allows Google, in cooperation with book publishers, to digitize and make available either portions of a text or the entire book online. The amount of text made available will depend on the agreements between the publishers, authors, and Google. For those interested in purchasing the item they have searched, there will be a "Buy the Book" link to online booksellers.

Initially extended to book publishers only, Google changed their criteria this past December when they contacted five of the world's largest libraries about digitizing items in their collections that are within the public domain. This specific aspect of the Google Print project will focus on digitizing collections from the 5 major universities: Stanford, University of Michigan, Harvard, University of Oxford, and the New York Public Library (NYPL). By commencing with the books already falling in the public domain, the issue of copyright, for now, will be sidestepped. When the digitizing of books outside the public domain commences. searchers will search the full text of a book but only be provided with three brief excerpts from the books listed in their search results.

The University of Michigan, the university providing access to the largest number of items, will allow Google to digitize all of their collection, an extraordinary 7.8 millions volumes. The project has been going forward for several months and looks to take six years to complete.

Harvard, Stanford, and the NYPL, on the other hand, have initially agreed to a pilot with Google. Harvard will allow 40,000 randomly selected volumes to be scanned, and Stanford will allow scanning of over 100,000 items that fall within the public domain, with a decision to be made in the future about other items in their collection. The NYPL has agreed to allow Google to scan somewhere between 10,000 and 100,000 public domain items to be selected by the librarians. Oxford University will allow Google to scan all of its volumes from the 19<sup>th</sup> century, some 1.5 million items.

As information continues to explode on the Internet, Google has forged ahead with a worthwhile initiative that will make millions of valuable books available for full text searching on the Internet. The added benefit is that Google is spending the money to take the project forward, at a cost of ten dollars per book, meaning no cost for the libraries so far involved in the project.

She reports that "after being a member and active in the Special Libraries Association for five years, I am very excited to be working in a special library, doing the serials work that I love. My responsibilities are similar to my last position (leading the library in all aspects of serials acquisitions: fiscal control and serials management), except that I will work with about 19 thousand serials, instead of 8 thousand!
