The Corcoran, an accredited college of art and design, is an innovative leader in visual arts education and one of only three museum-college partnerships in the nation. Longtime DCLA member **Carolyn Clugston Michaels** passed away on Saturday, November 1, 2008. Carolyn was originally from Chicago, but moved to Maryland where she graduated from Bethesda Chevy Chase High School in 1935. Carolyn graduated from Catholic University with a Master's in Library Science in 1956, and went on to a long and successful career as a school librarian, with positions at the Maret School, Holton-Arms School, and St. Albans School. She served as Curriculum Laboratory Librarian at the professional library for the public schools in Montgomery County, Maryland. Carolyn's interest in children's literature and libraries also took her to the National Geographic Magazine, where she worked as a researcher in the Special Publications Division. She was a Staff Librarian

at the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, where she collaborated in the development of a catalogue for the Genealogical Library with her colleague, **Kathryn S. Scott**. Carolyn wrote two books: <u>School Libraries</u> <u>Worth Their Keep</u> (Scarecrow Press, 1972) and <u>Library Literacy Means Lifelong Learning</u> (Scarecrow Press, 1985). With her husband Bill, she wrote <u>Children's Book Collecting</u> (Shoestring Press, 1993). Following their retirement in the



early 1980s, Carolyn and Bill made their home in Charleston, South Carolina, where she continued her engagement with libraries as a part-time Reference Librarian at the Charleston County Public Library. She will be remembered for her significant contributions to D.C. Libraries and DCLA.

Director **Yvonne Carignan** of the Historical Society of Washington D.C. (HSW) Kiplinger Research Library announces the receipt of the 2008 Washington Conservation Guild's Angels Project. The Project will improve storage for the HSW textile collection which consists largely of historic costumes which include, for example, a dress purchased by Marian Hooper Adams from the noted Parisian designer Worth in 1879. Adams wore the dress to a January1882 dinner attended by the new Cabinet and President Arthur.

Angels Projects are pro-bono work days for which Washington Conservation Guild members volunteer their conservation expertise at a particular historic site. They are generally conducted all in one day, although the preparation and follow-up require additional time. Angels Projects pair conservators with collections that need care. A group of conservators typically preservation. The Foundation for the American Institute for Conservation granted nearly \$1,000 for supplies for proper storage of the HSW textile collection. The history of Angels Projects dates back to the late 1980s when members of WCG's parent group, the American Institute for Conservation, began incorporating Angels Projects at sites near their annual meetings. During the following years, Angels have rehoused collections for storage upgrades, preserved daguerreotypes

and tintypes, backed paintings, rolled large textiles, and prepared collections for moving. Joanna Dunn, Angels Project Coordinator, has worked with Kiplinger Research Library Director Yvonne Carignan to develop projects.

William F. Tuceling, Reference Librarian at the US Government Accountability Office Technical Library, reports that for the sixth straight year, the Knowledge Services (KS) team at the Government Accountability Office (GAO) hosted a day-long InfoFair in the main hall of the headquarters building in Washington, DC. All five of KS's offices – Information Assets (Records), Information Services (Library), Publicity and Graphics (PAGs), Shared Services Centers (SSCs), and Web Content – mounted multi-table displays, provided product demonstrations, and handed out literature describing their services. Two other related GAO units – the Learning Center and the Office of Security – presented displays as well. In addition, seven outside vendors – Congressional Quarterly, Dialog, Leadership Directories, Lexis-Nexis, OCLC/FirstSearch, ProQuest, and Thompson Reuters – which provide agency-wide access to information resources were on hand to share knowledge of their services' contents and operations with the more than 500 GAO analysts and attorneys who visited InfoFair'08. Bill Tuceling is a past member of the DCLA Executive Board and recipient of the DCLA Distinguished Service Award. He currently chairs the Ruth Fine Student Financial Assistance Committee. Petworth Neighborhood Library at 4200 Kansas Avenue, NW was the sixth Neighborhood Library to open in the District, and the third to be funded strictly through public appropriations. The library opened on January 27, 1939 to rave reviews. The two-and-a-half story Georgian Revival-style library building was designed by the DC Municipal Architect, **Nathan C. Wyeth**, and in cooperation with the DC Library's Board of Trustees and the library staff. Sited on public property donated by the DC School Board, the library stands adjacent to MacFarland Junior High School and Theodore Roosevelt High School, along Iowa Avenue between Webster and Upshur streets, NW.

Andres Ciriello, recently completed his library degree at the University of Maryland. While at American University, Andres received the 2007 **Ruth Fine Memorial** Student Financial Aid award. He now works at the University of Maryland.
